These two claims known as the "Cooper" and "Fhippen" olsims take in nearly all our original territory on the northerly side of the river, for New Marblohead, now Windham, was laid out on the 17th day of May, 1735, as follows: "We began at a place called Saccarappa Falls on Presumpsoot River and as the river runs to a great pend called Sebago Fond; thence north 45 degrees, east 4 miles and 120 rods; thence south 45 degrees, east to Horth Yarmouth back line; thence 3 miles, 46 degrees west to the corner of North Yarmouth and Falmouth boundary; thence south 24 degrees, 20 minutes, 8 miles and 50 rods to Saccarappa Falls.

The boundary line between Windham and that part of almouth which is now Westbrook remained in controversy until Novembor 27, 1761 when it was established as at present, existing by an act of the General Court. The first settlement in Windham is said to have been July 30, 1737 by Captain Thomas Chute, who carried his family and effects up the river by the present route of the many canoos and small motor boats of today, and made a clearing and erected his log cabin where he afterwards kept an ordinary on land by the river side lately owned by the father of the late ex-mayor Mahlon H. Webb. But previous to this time, from July 8, 1735 to June 0, 1737, the grantees had spent considerable sums of money in building bridges over the Presumpscot River immediately above Saccarappa Falls, and on Inkhorn and Colley Wright's (now Dole's) brooks, and clearing a highway for the incoming of the settlors. That large tract of land was long in dispute between the proprietors of the two towns, but none of the first home lots in Windham were laid out upon the samo. It seems, however, that some encroachments were made thereon

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by the Windham grantees for it appears in an old deed that the farm formorly owned by the late Daniel D. Shaw was laid out to Richard Dana of Boston, to component him for a forest grant which he had been obliged to give up after the adjustment of the division line between Windham and Palmouth was found to be in Palmouth.

The bridge for which the Windham grantees made appropriation at Saccarapps, if ever built, probably did not long continue to be used, for at a town meeting hold at Felmouth March 10, 1759, it was voted that "The selectmon be directed to lay out the money assessed on the mills at Saccarappy and Ammoneongan that year to repair the Great Bridge at Saccarappy."

The same year a return was made of a read "beginning at Saccarappa Read at a pine tree, marked, near the corner of David Small's land at Deer Hill, thence by southeasterly courses which are given till it intersects with a read that is laid out to Presumpseet Hiver by Joseph Conant's land. Small is said to have lived on the same spot where the residence of the late Clement P. Maxwell new stands; and Conant's land was probably the tract of 60 acres laid out to him by the Falmouth Proprietors.

Whatever was done about the money assessed on the mills for the repairing of the "great Bridge" at Saccarapps seems not to have been satisfactory to the good people then living in Windham, at least not for any great longth of time, for at a town meeting held in Palmouth, February 9, 1756 the selectmen were made a committee without pay to confer "with the inhabitants of Hew Marblehead and others to see how much they will advance toward building a bridge over the Presumpsoot River and fix the mest proper place therefore," and make report to the town at the ensuing annual meeting.
